Free Reading Materials for People with Disabilities • Our National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled (NLS) is a free library service for people with a temporary or permanent visual impairment, physical disability, or reading disability that prevents them from easily reading regular print. NLS offers books and magazines in audio and braille that can be instantly downloaded, played on a personal smart device, or mailed to a patron's home free of charge. The NLS collection has more than 160,000 titles – from current bestsellers to classics.
